Parenting Top Tip

Fireworks night is nearly upon us, and many children are eager to attend local firework displays. Fun for all the family! Events like this do come with their challenges though. There are a few things that you can do to make sure that you not only all have a fabulous time, but everyone stays safe.



Boundaries and expectations – Children need to know what is expected of them and thrive on boundaries. There needs to be a separate set of boundaries for going to a fireworks display and these need to be discussed before you go. Praise your child for doing the right thing.

Safe and unsafe – A fireworks display is a perfect time to help children learn about safe and unsafe risk. Fire, fireworks and sparklers all have potential to hurt but if safety guidelines are followed, everyone can stay safe. Model following instructions yourself and supervise them so everyone can enjoy a fun evening.

Activity Idea - Glow Stick Seek

You'll need: 4 glow sticks per person

This is a similar idea to an Easter Egg Hunt, but in the dark. Once the sun has set, snap the glow sticks so that they start to glow and hide them in various places around the house. With the lights off, let your children loose – looking through the house to find the colourful glow sticks. Like the parenting top tip above – walking or running around in the dark poses a very low level of risk, but this means it's a good opportunity to let your children learn about safe risk.

Once all the glow sticks are found, maybe they can put them on their wrists and ankles and play normal hide and seek, with the added difficulty of them now glowing... great fun!
