### Safeguarding in schools

Safeguarding is at the heart of everything we do in school but as much as this is automatic, or behind-the-scenes, some of the things we do may not be as apparent to parents in the community. Staff have regular safeguarding training, not only at the start of the academic year, but also every week during our briefings and whenever there is new guidance or important messages to share. Senior staff are all additionally trained as safeguarding leads, with bespoke training on how to best support parents and families and ensure pupil welfare is at the heart of school. We are visited by external agencies, and by governors, to review our safeguarding procedures and these have consistently shown a high level of dedication, and strong ethos, surrounding safeguarding at school.

We also have rigorous processes around the safety of children in the building – all areas are risk assessed and these are regularly reviewed, including through visits from the local authority. We can seek advice from the LA if there is ever additional support required. As part of the OPAL process, staff have been trained to conduct rapid benefit-risk assessments to manage the outside area and we have ensured staff are in hi-vis jackets outside so that children know who to go to if they have a problem. We teach the children regularly, through assemblies and PSHE lessons, about how they can keep themselves safe and who to go to when they are finding something difficult.

We also want parents to feel we are there if they have concerns and you can always find a member of the Inclusion or Senior Leadership Team on the gates if you would like to raise a concern. Sonja, the school social worker, is able to provide a whole wealth of support to families and children and is also available for a conversation if this would be helpful. Staff in school work very hard to support all the children as best we can, and it is important that parents are reassured that keeping your children safe is a top priority.

### Make sure your child has all their childhood vaccinations:

The local NHS are urging parents and carers of children under five to ensure their children are fully vaccinated, especially those children who are starting primary school this September. Before starting primary school, it's recommended that children have their measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) and four-in-one pre-school booster vaccine, which protects against diphtheria, polio, tetanus, and whooping cough. Many of these diseases have self-isolating periods of at least a week, which means not only will the child miss school, but parents/carers will have to stay off work too until the self-isolation period ends.

Parents and carers are urged to contact their GP practice directly to book vaccinations, or they can contact Herts Community Trust who can help arrange any missed vaccinations for them by calling 0300 555 5055 option 4.
